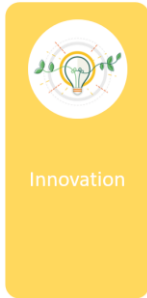

 Evidence & interpretation (source, historian)

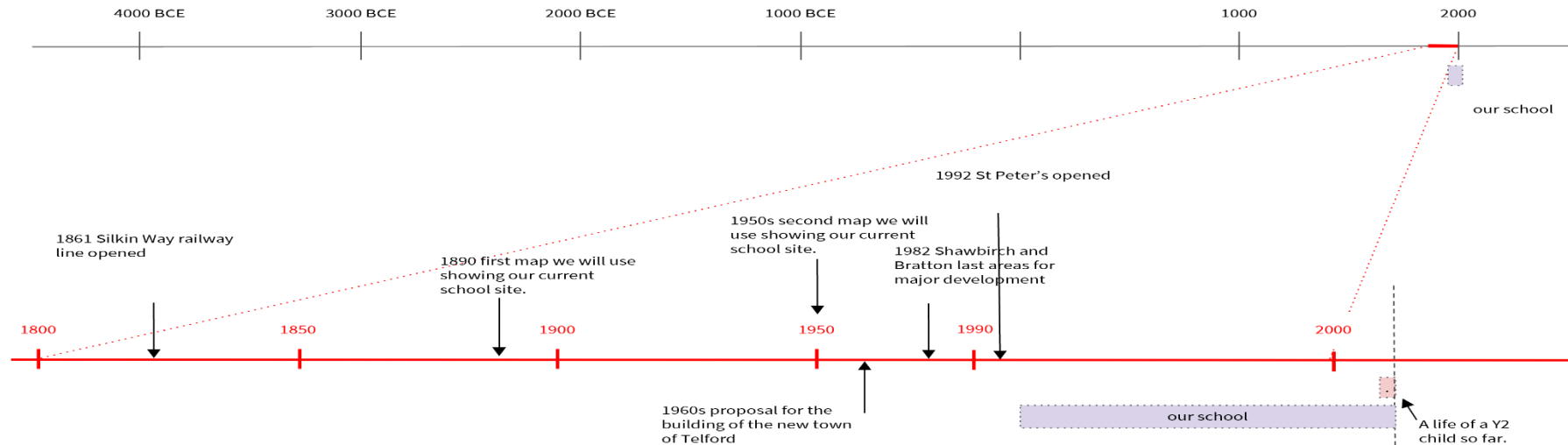
Specific knowledge:

To answer the question: What was Bratton like in 1890?
 To answer the question: How had Bratton changed in the 1950's?
 To answer the question: Why did Bratton and Shawbirch expand after 1950?
 To answer the question: What do photographs (source) tell us about the building of St Peter's?
 To answer the question: How has the school building changed since 1992?
 To answer the question: How has Bratton and St Peter's changed?

Prior Learning:

Work on sources from the Great Fire of London will be further developed with the use of photographs and the opportunity for potential oral history.

Local Links:

Opportunity to explore local area and potential to share knowledge locally.
 Exploring the Silkin Way for any evidence of industrial past.
 Using the school building to collect evidence of changes over time.
 Greater appreciation of the significance of where they go to school.

Skills:

Understand chronology – a timeline shows a period of time. Time is linear and we can show when things happened.
 Looking at artefacts and objects and talking about what they notice. Making links between them.
 Asking questions about the past and using developing knowledge to begin to answer these.
 Looking at their surroundings as evidence of changes and sources of historical information.

Possible enrichment:

Southwater Library to use their viewing tables to see different maps of the local area at different times.
 Mini Museum to share knowledge with school/local area.
 Link to the 30th Anniversary celebrations next year.
