Prior learning

Good Friday is a day of mourning in church.

Pupils reflect on how Mary or the disciples felt that Jesus' death is called Good Friday.

The holy week is an important festival in the Christian calendar

Key Aspects covered

In this unit of RE work children will know:

- The significance of the Last Supper when Jesus' washes the disciples' feet.
- Symbolic means related to Easter in the story of the Last Supper.
- Passover should be a great celebration.
- Passover is a festival every year during which Jewish people remember the terrible things that happened to them in Egypt.
- The importance of Jesus and Salvation.

Big Ideas

Pupils understand that Passover is a great celebration that is held yearly, and that Jewish people also celebrate Passover.

Why do Christians remember the events of Holy Week every year?

Pupils to explore how the consequences of betrayal lead to Jesus' death.

Knowledge expectations

- To explain what Judas' betrayal and Peter's denial might mean of the Last Supper.
- To understand why Jesus wanted his disciples to remember what the bread and wine represented in the Last Supper.

- to understand why Christians, remember key events from Holy week.
- Make clear links between Gospel text and how Christians remember and celebrate and serve Maundy Thursday including Holy communion.
- Describe how Christians show their beliefs about Jesus in their everyday lives.
