What is economic migration?

Understand economic reasons for migration.

Know how migration to the UK has been for mainly economic reasons.

Understand the impact of economic migration.

What is a refugee?

Understand what a refugee is.

Explore why some people are refugees.

Describe why many people have left their homes in Syria/Gaza.

How will climate change affect migration?

Explain what climate change is and how climate is changing.

Understand how climate change is creating climate refugees.
