Unit name: Growing and changing. Growing older, naming body parts, moving class or year.

Main concepts:

- To know about the human life cycle and how people grow from young to old
 - To understand how our needs and bodies change as we grow up
 - To identify and name the main parts of the body including external genitalia (e.g. vulva, vagina, penis, testicles)
 - To know about change as people grow up, including new opportunities and responsibilities
 - To begin preparing to move to a new class and setting goals for next year
- Possible outcomes– drama, leaflet, freeze frame photo, poster

Prior knowledge. Children should already...

- Be able to recognise what makes them special and unique (from year 1).
- Be able to recognise their likes/dislikes and what they are good at.
- Be able to begin to manage their feelings and their responses.

How the children are to be taught this.

Use teacher judgment to decide whether this should be blocked to a day or taught over smaller sessions, dependent upon the cohort.

The body parts section of this unit will need to be taught by the class teacher.
