

Mothering Sunday


Mothering Sunday is celebrated by Christians in the United Kingdom, falling on the fourth Sunday in Lent, three weeks before Easter Sunday.





Attendance Update

The attendance in school is great news. We are above national and local for school attendance- so thank you. Attendance in school is so important.

As you may have seen in the national press, attendance in schools is a big priority with the Department For Education.

There have been some important changes which we will regularly remind you of. One of the most important is taking time out of school in term time. This is called 'Leave in Term Time' (LITT)

As you already may know the fines and consequences have changed.

Each LITT request is <u>considered individually</u>. However, holidays, in most cases, will not be seen as exceptional circumstances. In most cases- this does also include weddings.

If your request is not authorised, then you are liable to fines and possibly criminal prosecution. We really do not want any of our families to have criminal records.

Key points of the law.

- 1. Penalty Notices fines will be issued to each parent, for each child that was absent without authorisation. Example: 3 siblings absent during term time, will result in each parent receiving 3 separate fines.
- 2. A Penalty Notice must be considered by all schools in England for: unauthorised absence during a 10 school week period.
 - o 5 consecutive days (10 sessions) one after the other.
 - 10 non consecutive sessions not one after the other.

Note: The 10 school week period can go across different school terms or school years.

First Offence

The first time a Penalty Notice issued (after 19 August 2024) for unauthorised absence the amount will be: £160 per parent, per child if paid within 28 calendar days.

Discounted to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 calendar days.

Second Offence (within 3 years)

The second time a Penalty Notice issued for unauthorised absence the amount will be:

£160 per parent, per child if paid within 28 calendar days.

No discount for paying within 21 calendar days.

Third and Any Further Offences

The third time an offence is committed a Penalty Notice will not be issued.

The case will instead be presented straight to the Magistrate's Court.

Prosecution can result in a criminal record a fine of up to £2,500.

Cases found guilty in Magistrate's Court can show on the parent's future DBS certificate due to 'failure to safeguard a child's education'.

Although these fines do not seem much, it does add up.


This is an example:-A family of two parents and two children would have a fine of £720 if paid within 28 days, reduced to £320 if paid before 21 days. The second LITT would automatically be a fine of £720. The 3rd LITT – no fine just straight to court if within 3 Years.

Wraparound Easter Holiday Club

- There's not long left to book spaces for Easter half term, the closing date for final bookings is now Monday April 7th 6pm, once closed we can't accept any late bookings.
- A reminder that children are to not bring in toys from home to club, unless it's holiday club where any toys brought from home are the child's responsibility to look after.
 - We also have a no electronics rule during holiday club, so please don't send your child in with any form of mobiles, tablets or game consoles.
- We hope that the weather over Easter holidays will be nice and dry, so we will be making the most of the park & field.
- Children are allowed to bring in a bike/scooter with a helmet to holiday club, again their responsibility to look after & we do say to not let other children on their bikes/scooters.
- Children need to bring their packed lunch and a water bottle, a small healthy snack for morning snack and something for afternoon snack.



In year 2 we have been really interested by our new theme of the Olympics. We have started researching facts to use in a report in our English lessons. Did you know that women weren't allowed to compete in the Ancient Olympics? We were also interested to learn about a game called Pankration that only had 2 rules: no biting and no poking your opponent in the eye. In History we are focusing on the lives of significant individuals who have competed in the Olympics and Paralympics. We started by learning about local Paralympian Mickey Bushell.



In DT after exploring ways to join fabrics we have designed Olympic Mascot glove puppets and have begun sewing and decorating them. Here are some of our wonderful designs...














Egyptians
